

THE WITCH HUNTER

Freemasonry has had its share of “witch hunters” over the centuries, but one emerges as the most notorious and infamous. Unfortunately, he was “one of our own.” Like the early real witch hunters of Salem, Massachusetts, he went hunting for “witches” except in Masonic ritual, and naturally found them—essentially the same as hunting innocent little old ladies, somewhat disfigured by time, and unable to defend themselves.



Our witch hunter was Edmond Ronayne (c.1800–c.1890), a Past Master. Freemasonry simply used such material to illustrate a moral point associated with Masonic dogma (belief system).

He went so far as to say that the secret of a Master Mason was paganism (pagan worship). Remarkably, he attacked the Roman Catholic Church on the same grounds, stating that it was even worse than Freemasonry.

Of course, the book gathered dust for over 100 years, but has now emerged on the Internet. Beyond doubt it is being used by modern-day witch hunters and has brought about the absurdities you might see on websites and in television documentaries.
