RESULTS OF BALLOT ON MEETING NIGHTS

The result shows an overwhelming preference for two meetings a month, with the preference for Plan C. For those preferring Plan C, it is 2 to 1 in favor of the last Friday. Therefor I propose that we continue with two meetings a month on the basis that the last meeting of the month, which is the first of the two in successive weeks, be devoted to prepared talks either by our own members or visitors, annual exhibit, etc.

The second meeting, which is the first Friday of the month, would be a business meeting, including meetings of the Board of Governors as called, to be followed by more informal programs, such as Turkey hash, quizzes, perhaps members competitions, including swapping if anyone is so inclined. If for any reason such as a holiday the meeting night for business would not be available, the business meeting could still be held the previous week.

This proposal may or may not require a change in the by-lawswhich the by-laws committee will investigate and report on at the September meeting.

In connection with the ballots on meeting nights, only five cards contained any comments at all, and only two contained suggestions.

Bro. Brazer misses the pre-meeting get-togethers we used to have at the Masonic Club and suggests that arrangements be made for those who want to have dinner together before the meeting can do so. Bro. Matters tried quite unsuccessfully to make such arrangements about a year or two ago, and got few if any takers. Still it's a good idea.

Bro. Lindquist endorses the idea of local chapters, in other cities in the State. This will be attempted when and if the membership approves the necessary changes in our by-laws.

PROPOSED DESIGN FOR THE COLORADO COMMEMORATIVE STAMP


It was at a meeting of the Denver Masonic Stamp Club, last year, that the subject of a Colorado stamp was proposed, because on August 1, 1951, Colorado became 75 years old, The idea was enthusiastically received and a committee appointed. Bro. John C. Kringle as Chairman of the Committee had done practically all the promotion work. All the other stamp clubs in Denver joined in the movement as well as stamp



clubs about the State. Wide publicity was secured in the Press including the Catholic press because they were interested in the dominant theme of the design, the Mountain of the Holy Cross.

Our Congressmen get behind the request, especially our U.S. Senators Ed. C. Johnson, who is a Mason and Eugene Milliken, who is not a Mason. I think it was the work of these Senators which really put it over against the expressed wishes of the P.O. Department. Up until the middle of February 1951, the P.O. insisted that no recognition could be given for a 75th anniversary of any kind. Consequently we were very much pleased when we had our Senators' telegram announcing the approval of the stamp.

Of course, we did not know if our suggested design was to be adopted but at least we were on record as desiring to commemorate the most distinctive feature of Colorado scenery and history, the Mount of the Holy Cross. The proposed design was not the work of Bro. William A. Goebel, who is a member and officer of the Denver Masonic Stamp Club. He may have been the author of the first suggested design which did not contain the Holy Cross. This distinctive feature was incorporated into the design by the committee and the new design approved by the club. The best photograph of the famous mountain was made in the 1870's by a noteworthy photographer by the name of Jackson



We followed his picture. We asked that the date of issue be set as August 1st, 1951, and the release of first day of issue in the small town of Minturn on the D & R G W, which is the nearest town to the mountain. Harry W. Bundy, third member of the committee, is the Grand Secretary of all four Grand Bodies of Colorado. I am on his office staff.

Shriners View Stamp Display

During the New York City convention of the Shrine, July 8 to 14, the Masonic Stamp Club of New York, under the auspices of Major Thomas Phillips, staged a Masonic stamp exhibition, at the Collectors Club. The club frames were filled with exhibits by Sidney Barrett, Sam Brooks, Jacob S. Glaser and Harry M. Konwiser.

The Barrett collection consists of stamps on and off cover showing Masonic cancellations, placed on them by Masons who were postmasters in the 1861-81 period.

The Brooks collection ties up the Masonic Presidents of the United States, showing their autographs and stamps on which they are depicted.

The Jake Glaser display featured "philatelic items" relating to the Masonic Stamp Club and Masonry in general. Harry M. Konwiser showed a Valley Forge letter of 1778, as written by Nathaniel Greene, who is depicted on a stamp and who was a mason; also, a War Order, as signed by Gen. Winfield Scott, together with a block of 24¢ War Department stamps. Washington and Houston postmarks were shown, likewise the Serbian anti-Masonic stamps of 1941. John A Mirt's Masonic covers were also on exhibition.

Many members of the Masonic Stamp club are Shriners, including Henry Holcombe, present Potentate of Mecca Temple, the first of the Temples.

Jake Glaser, active in the Masonic Stamp Club, as well as the Collectors Club, made certain the nobles were advised of the stamp show for shriners. The official Shriners program mentioned the Collectors Club as the place to visit for Shriners interested in stamps.

Dear Brother Philatelist:

The recent poll of Round Robin Members for their opinion as to whether this information should be issued in a permanent form for each member resulted in an overwhelming vote in favor of such a plan.

Accordingly, the Vol. 1, No. 1 issue of 'MASONRY ON POSTAGE STAMPS' has been issued. It is being sent to everyone heretofore on the Round Robin list, including those who failed to reply and those few who did not care for such a plan. The latter have been included in the initial number to acquaint them with the new form.

For those who wish to participate in the new plan, here is the way it works.

About once a month material of interest to Masonic philatelists will be sent out in mimeographed form, to be retained by the recipients. For this they will pay 25¢ for each issue (a suggested method is \$1 a time, commemorative stamps acceptable). Any surplus remaining after actual production and mailing costs will be turned over to the entertainment fund of the Illinois Masonic Orphans Home. There will be no compensation for anyone connected with the Service. Any member may drop out at any time upon notice. An effort will be made to provide about three pages each issue, although this may not always be possible.

For those who prefer the old method, the information will be placed in circulation. The recipient is expected to forward the material as rapidly as possible to the next name on the list. The disadvantage of that plan, it was found by experience, is that when the list is a long one there are many delays and often times the Round Robin is lost along the way. That was one of the objections which resulted in requests for the material in individual form.

U. S. POSTAL SLOGAN CANCELS

Slogan cancels are used in the "KILLER" part of the cancelling device by the Post Office Department in order to deface and cancel the postage stamp. Meter Slogans affixed by means of the Pitney Bowes or Commercial Controls meter machines are not classified as Slogan Cancels.

WHAT TO COLLECT

- A- All slogans from all cities including all machines and machine numbers and hand cancel.
- B- One copy of each slogan from each type of machine and/or hand cancel.
- C- Specialized and/or limited (Special Subjects).
 - 1- Historical Bicentennials, Centennials, Sesquicentennials, Anniversaries, Jubilees
 - 2- Conventions, Congresses, Shows
 - 3- Fairs and Expositions N.Y. WORLD'S FAIR, GOLDEN GATE EXPOSITION
 - 4- War Slogans ENLIST TODAY, BUY WAR SAVINGS, FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR
 - 5- Post Office Utility MAIL EARLY, ADDRESS YOUR MAIL, NOTIFY, REGISTER
 - 6- Health CHRISTMAS SEALS, ERASE TB, CHECK YOUR CHEST, FIGHT TB
 - 7- Contributions GIVE RED CROSS, GIVE COMMUNITY CHEST/FUND
 - 8- Special Events NAVY DAY, CONSTITUTION WEEK, ALCHA WEEK
 - 9- Special Drives HIRE THE HANDICAPPED, FOREST FIRES, SAVE WATER
 - 10- Advertising SANGER THE NATIONS CHRISTMAS TREE CITY
 VISIT ROCHESTERS HIGHLAND PARK DURING LILAC TIME
 - 12- Topicals Parks, Army, Navy, etc.

HOW TO COLLECT

- A- Entire Cover 6 3/4 envelope (3 5/8" x 6 1/2")
 - 1- Mount in standard cover or photo albums
 - 2- File alphabetically by slogan or city in shoe boxes, 6 3/4 envelope boxes or drawer files.
- B- Government Postcards, 3% x 5% cards, 3 x 5 cards.
 - Mount or file same as covers. Slogans appear best when using 2 ½cent Presidentials on cards.
- C- 2x4's Strip cut from the envelopes or cards 2" x 4" including the dater circle, slogan cancel and stamp.
 - 1- Hinge mount on album pages in any way or position that suits you.
 - 2- File in match book boxes or any other suitable item.
- D- Socked On The Nose Slogan appearing on the stamp and stamp removed from envelope or card.
 - 1- Hinge mount by stamp and endeavour to obtain the same stamp with as many slogans as possible.
 - 2- Hinge mount on standard stamp album pages allowing a page for each slogan and endeavor to obtain the slogan on as many different stamps as possible.

When sending to Postmasters for Slogan Cancels it is advisable to make use of stamps with light colors, such as, GOLD STAR, ANNAPOLIS, 1/2 and 6¢ Pres. on the envelopes or cards which are to bear the cancel. Dark colored stamps will conceal the cancel unless the stamps are placed in a position to receive the strike of the dater circle.
