

Gutzon Borglum (1871-1941) was a Past Master of Howard Lodge No. 35 in New York City. His large sculpture of Lincoln's head is in the rotunda of the Capital Washington, D.C. (Scott #1114). His memorial statue symbolizing the colonization of the West (Scott #837) is in Marietta, Ohio. Borglum's best known work is the Mount Rushmore National Memorial (Scott #1011) carved in the Black Hills of South Dakota, His son Lincoln Borglum, a member of Black Hills Lodge No. 92, Hermosa, SD completed the Mount Rushmore project.





MASONIC POSTCARD COLLECTING Howard Lasker Washington Lodge No. 85, Albany, N.Y.

Stamp collecting with all its various avenues to explore, is so fascinating, how could anyone ask for anything more in a homby? Being a very active and dedicated Mason for the past 38 years and being a philatelist even longer, I thought seeking out Masonic personages and Masonic buildings and symbols on stamps, and finding them, was as interesting and absorbing as a hobby could get.

Then I saw my first Masonic Temple on a postcard. It was a gift from a friend who knew that I collected Masonic memorabilia. This one card started me looking for others. Then, when I learned that there were not only Masonic Temples but also Scottish Rite Temples, Shrine Temples and Mosques, Masonic Homes and Hospitals, Masonic Emblems and themes on postcards, I saw an entire new world of collecting opening for me. I started visiting antique stores, flea markets, any place where I thought I might find a collection of postcards to leaf through, looking for a "Masonic" card.

Something that I discovered was that during World War II, a number of Temples opened their doors to servicemen, operating centers and canteens for them in their buildings. These cards are of particular interest to me as I am of that wintage. The Grand Lodge of the State of New York operated twelve such centers. There is a set of twelve postcards picturing these. I have seven of them and am still humting for the missing five. What a thrill it will be for me whem I locate them.

I also found out that years ago, many Lodges printed meeting notices on post cards. How would you like to be reminded of a meeting on a picture post card of your Lodge?

Then there is a group of cards with Masonic Emblems and Aprons, Shriner's Emblems, O.E.S. Emblems, etc. to look for. These are especially interesting and attractive, but also hard to come by.

As my collection grew, in order for me to make sense of it, I had to start categorizing it. I now have about 900 different postcards, divided into categories such as Masonic Temples, Homes, Hospitals, Scottish Rite Temples, Shrine Temples and Mosques, Servicemen's Centers, National Shrines, Government printed postcards, Foreign postcards, and my favorite topic, Humorous postcards.

There is a British set of "Are You A Mason?" cards that is outstanding. The U.S. has a whole group of "I love to love a Mason" cards, (because a Mason won't tell) that is also worth seeking out.

Once I had exhausted all my local dealers' stocks of Masonic postcards, I started writing to collectors wherever I could locate them, to swap duplicates. Through my collection of these cards, I have made friends with brethren, not only throughout the United States, but also throughout the world - brethren from England, Ireland, Scotland, brethren from France, Austria, Spaim, Italy, The Philippines, etc. It is always a thrill when the mailman hands me my mail and I see a letter with some exotic, foreign stamps on it. Also when you see some of the foreign Lodge rooms that are pictured on these cards, you will find it hard to believe such magnificent, ormate rooms exist today. The Lodge rooms in the Tokyo Temple is absolutely breath-taking. The Lodge rooms in Corpers of All, London, Dublin, Vienna, etc. are outstanding. Trading postcards has created for me lasting and rewarding friendships.

At one point in time, it was relatively easy to find Masonic post cards. However, with more collectors joining the humt, these cards are becoming scarce and more difficult to obtain and more expensive. The law of supply and demand has taken over. Accordingly when you are fortunate enough to locate a few, the pleasure in finding them is that much greater. You will find collecting these cards a most interesting and rewarding hobby. Also your views on Freemasonry will expand when you see small one-room Masonic Temples that appear unable to seat more tham fifty brothers, and the other extreme, Temples that are magnificent, Cathedral-like structures that can seat several thousand brethren.

If just purchasing stamps and placing them in albums is losing some of its thrill for you and you are looking for something additional to collect, try hunting for Masonic postcards. You will not be disappointed with this new and most intriguing source of enjoyment in collecting.



SIR ALEXANDER FLEMING

As I was perusing through my <u>Ten Thousand Freemasons</u> books, doing some research for our Masonic Stamp Club, the name of Alexander Fleming caught my eye. Memories of an illness I had as a young sailor quickly came to mind.

I was very proud of the fact that I had just received my Able Bodied Seaman papers and was on my way to pick up my ship SS Marine Leader, which was a charted ship with the Standard Oil Fleet. On the way to Bayonne, I felt pain at the base of my spine, but thought nothing of it. The SS Marine Leader left on a foreign voyage that evening, as tankers never stay in port long. I was on the four to twelve shift at the helm, and never gave much thought to the pain at the base of my spine that evening as I was busy getting acquainted with the crew. The pain had become much worse by the next morning's watch, and I could barely stand up. Captain Nagel came to the bridge, and quickly asked the second mate what was the matter with me. I was a little embarrassed, because this was my first cruise as an Able Bodied Seaman, but the pain soon became unbearable by the end of my watch. As soon as the Captain saw the swelling at the base of my spine he called the purser, who knew First Aid, up to the bridge. He diagnosed it as a pionidle cyst, and administered a shot of penicillin. By the end of the voyage my cyst was completely dried up and the purser was able to lance it as well as give me several more shots of penicillin. The miracle drug killed any infection, and allowed me to heal properly so that I could continue my duties on the ship.

The Brother Mason who discovered penicillin was born August 6, 1881, on a small farm in Ayrshire, Scotland, where he had to walk eight miles every day in order to attend school. He later moved to Kilmarnock, Scotland, where he attended an academy school. Fourteen year old Alexander finished his technical education in London where he was living with an older brother. Working for a steamship line kept him busy while attending college. Graduating with honors from St. Mary's Medical School in 1908, the newly created Doctor accepted a position with Sir Almoth Wright, one of the great medical men at that time.

While still in medical school, Alexander Fleming found the time to join the London Scottish Rifles, a regiment of volunteer soldiers and became an expert rifleman. At the outbreak of World War I in 1914, Dr. Fleming was made a Captain in the Royal Army Medical Corps. While continuing to work with Almoth Wright, Dr. Fleming studied wound infections.

Fleming became a Mason in Sancta Maria Lodge on June 8, 1909, #26082. He was installed Worshipful Master in 1924 and later served as Secretary. He received Distinguished Achievement Award from the Grand Lodge of New York in 1953. Brother Fleming joined Misericordia Lodge #3286 in London in 1925, became its Worshipful Master in 1935, and its Treasurer in 1942. He was exalted by the Royal Arch Masons of England, Chapter #2410 on July 27, 1923, and was their High Priest in both 1931 and 1942.

Brother Fleming died of a heart attack in his home in London on March 11, 1955.

When I was a young man, I did not realize that it was Brother Alexander Fleming who discovered penicillin and helped me become an "Able Bodied Seaman" again.




